

ALUMNI PROFILE

Frederick Blevins '60 Lived at the House Year-Round. While Attending Classes, He Washed Dishes, Assisted Joe Paterno, Managed the House and Worked on Campus

"Blevit" Did Stint in Germany before Settling Down on Long Island

1. Why did you join the fraternity?

I was in the forestry school at the Mont Alto campus of Penn State my freshman year. Alpha Zeta, from the main campus, rushed me there. I moved to the main campus and into the Alpha Zeta house my sophomore year. Alpha Zeta was a dry fraternity, and I was impressed by their academic standards. They were an honorary agricultural fraternity, not just a social drinking house—that appealed to me.

2. What was your favorite memory of the fraternity?

There was not one big event. It was very consistent from day-to-day. Almost everybody in the late '50s worked at a part-time job to get through school; nevertheless, we didn't let that affect our academics or our social lives.

In fact, in '56 or '57, we were rated the outstanding fraternity at Penn State. Also, when I transferred to the main campus and wanted to change my curriculum, two Alpha Zeta fraternity brothers introduced me to landscape architecture. Without them, I never would have made such a good decision.

3. Do you stay in contact with other alumni? Why do you contribute to the alumni association?

I have not kept in contact with anyone from Alpha Zeta during the last 20 years. I still believe the fraternity does good things for lots of people, so I want to help the house.

4. Tell us about your family.

I married Rodee, whom I met while stationed in Germany, after graduation. We divorced in '75 and I never remarried, but we are still close. She has a daughter, Patricia (46), and we have a son together, Chris (40).

5. What other activities or organizations were you involved with during your college days?

I was from Maryland and paying out-of-state tuition, so I worked part-time for the departments of sociology and landscape architecture. I also washed pots and pans at the fraternity, and was the sophomore football manager for Penn State under Joe Paterno (who was assistant coach then). In addition, I was the assistant house manager one summer while it was being rented out.

6. What is your nickname and how did your get it?

"Blevit." Once, the fraternity brought in a caricature artist to do our portraits. He asked what nickname to put on the bottom of mine. One of my brothers said "Blevit," and it stuck.

7. Did you live at the house? If so, who were your roommates?

Yes, I lived there for 4.5 years, including a stay at the annex for a couple of semesters when the house was overcrowded. In fact, I lived at the house practically year-round;

not only during the regular semesters, but also during a few summers while working on campus. We moved around a bit, so I had many roommates. Roy Prescott '58 was one of the roommates that I remember. He was a navy veteran.

8. What do you do for a living?

After Penn State, I joined the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers for two years of active duty. I attended training in Virginia and then went on to West Germany. When I returned to the states, I became employed by the New York State Department of Public Works (for highway and parkway landscape development). I was with New York state agencies for 42 years; most of the time with Long Island State Parks and Parkways. I retired on July 31, 2006.

9. What affiliations do you currently have and/or public service do you participate in?

I volunteer at the nature conservancy, taking care of vegetation in public areas on Long Island. I'm especially interested in controlling invasive plant species that come from overseas.

10. What hobbies do you enjoy?

I enjoy outdoor work and football.

11. What are your goals for the next few years?

I just want to stay healthy and keep working as a volunteer.
